Welcome to the 2023 Annual General Meeting of the Medway Towns District Scout Council. The reporting year 22/23 proved to be another challenging year as Scouting continues to grow further to surpass pre pandemic numbers.

The Census showed strong growth reinforced by the new Squirrels provision, and to date 9 groups now have Squirrels which is a huge accomplishment for all those involved within the district.

Hopefully you will have seen the reports and financial statement of accounts presented by the District Team and Trustee Board via the links sent out through the various media channels.

Medway Towns District Scout Council is a registered charity governed by the Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) of The Scouts. The District Scout Council is responsible for providing management, and support to Scout Groups across the District as well as events and activities.

The members of the District Trustee Board are charity trustees of the Scout District. Appointed under POR through nomination or election at the AGM, they serve for one year and are eligible for re-election or re-appointment if so willing. Other trustees may be coopted during the year to serve until the next AGM.

The District Trustee Board must act collectively, and in the best interests of its members, ensuring compliance with the Associations rules, along with management of finances, property, equipment and insurance. The focus has been on supporting Groups to get back to full strength with Leaders and Young people alike and it is great to see Groups working together and helping each other out. Whilst we were disappointed to lose the 21st Strood Scout Group, we are pleased to report the new 1st Medway Towns Scout Group is going from strength to strength. The Leaders are working closely with the District and has now established itself with a view to be fully independent once their bank account has been opened. For all those involved we must give credit for their perseverance and support to what is already a very strong group.

The Governance Sub Committee continues to ensure everything is above board and safeguard all our members, trustees and property.

The Finance Sub Committee have continued to keep on top of the finances & budgets and introducing online banking and modernising processes. Including New accounts with Lloyds The Appointments Advisory Committee manages the process of inducting new leaders and is also responsible for training compliance, probably the two most loathed words in the District over the last few years, however it is pleasing to report we continue to have one of the best compliance records in the County. This also was apparent at the APEX conference at Canterbury University recently where the district was referenced for its innovative processes ahead of the changes currently taking place.

The Districts campsite, Buckmore Park is operated by the CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation) on behalf of Medway Town Scouts and is responsible for the day-to-day operations, management and continued development of the park.

Appointed under POR through nomination or election at the AGM, they serve for one year and are eligible for re-election or reappointment if so willing. 2021 /22 saw a welcome return to face-to-face Scouting with the obvious multitude of precautions and measures in place to avoid returning to the dark days of lockdown again.

This did limit the District Team with regards to larger activities and events and the focus was therefore very much on supporting Groups and Leaders to get back up and running, including growth, recruitment, and training.

The Jan 21 census had shown a significant drop in numbers and it was pleasing to see numbers increasing as the year went on proving Scouting was as popular as ever. Circumstances had changed for many adults and leaders, hence our recruitment of new adults and support from across the District was vital to fill gaps and helping Groups in keeping sections running.

Training has been a hot potato for everyone involved in Scouting over the past two years and after a lot of perseverance it is pleasing to see the District in a very healthy position now with regards to training compliance.

Nights away were very limited but a few Groups held smaller, local camps as well as expeditions to complete Chief Scout Awards for those that were restricted or moved Sections during lockdown.

Buckmore Park, the Districts campsite was key for many Groups as we came out of lockdown, utilising the vast open spaces and open air for weekly meetings and activities.

Buckmore Park itself continued to progress with the rebuild of its infrastructure with the focus over the last year on the installation of spacious, shiny new toilets and showers. This has been a monumental effort with extensive groundworks and installation of a new water main.

January this year saw the introduction of our first Squirrel Drays and these are proving very popular.

2021 into 22 was indeed a challenging year but the ingenuity and resourcefulness of everyone involved in the District has been outstanding to see.

Covid wiped out a District Camp planned for June 20, and we promised as soon as it was safe to do so, we would restage it, no one anticipated waiting as long as we did, but it was well worth the wait. April this year saw over a 1000 young people and adults descend on Buckmore for a fantastic weekend that exceeded all our expectations, lots of fun was had by all as we celebrated St Georges Day, 70 Years of Buckmore Park and of course getting back to normality.

Medway Towns District Scouts District Lead Volunteer Report

2022/2023 was another positive year in Medway Scouts. The hangover from 'the virus that shall not be named' crisis took longer to shake off than we anticipated but this period of reporting is feeling very normal again.

This positive theme continued as we collected the census data. Our overall growth saw a rise in young people of 224. We had 5 groups over 100, 2 over 90 and the top 10 all over 70. All but 4 of our 19 groups recorded growth! All groups have Beavers through to Explorers. We have 91 sections in total. Squirrels reached 86 members. We have 5 Drays.

Our District Campsite, Buckmore Park, continues to be the jewel in our crown. The motivated and visionary crew continue to maintain and improve all aspects of the site. This is helping us encourage our groups to visit for activities or camping or sometimes just to meet in the wonderful woodland environment. A regular Buckmore Blog features in our newsletter so that everyone can be excited and up to date with the progress. **Our most humble thanks go to everyone in the crew that work so hard for us all.**

'Ingle Nook' at Buckmore Park also housed our book of Condolence as we paid our respects to Queen Elizabeth.

Our groups have been coming out in their droves to support District events again. All the section teams are meeting and planning their next programs.

Eight of our groups attended the Knockout KIJ camp and had the most amazing experiences.

We caught up with our Chief Scout Awards Celebrations. 100 recipients received an old-fashioned invitation in the post to join us in the grand St George's church. Buckmore Park Scout Campsite – Medway Towns District AGM Report 2022/2023

We start this report with a big thank you to all those who have helped at Buckmore Park in the past year. Your support is important to us as we continue to develop your campsite. Buckmore Park is run by a small management team on behalf of Medway Towns Scout District but it needs your continuing support to grow to meet the needs of our Scouting movement.


The year started with a very big challenge, the District camp. This required a lot of logistics to ensure it ran smoothly, from arrival to finish. It was achieved by the TEAM with the support of our neighbours who allowed us to use their car park and field. It was a very successful event, and the weather was kind. This was also a big test for our new toilets and showers. It highlighted some issues that we have now put right. This event is to be repeated in 2024.

One issue the site had was lack of water pressure. Our water main was not big enough and



was shared with the Kart track. The solution was to re-lay it with a bigger pipe, all 160m of it. This was a major job and completed by our crew with part funding by the Kart track. It has resulted in a great improvement, so well worth it.

Throughout the year we have had a number of D of E expedition groups using the site from a range of organisations. Our location is good for both training and expeditions themselves. We also have







The summer holiday saw several week-long camps take place. With visitors from, Brighton, North London, Lydd and of course our own District. The feedback we received was very positive especially about our toilet and shower facilities.

We have introduced monthly working parties this year. These are held at weekends and are for all the District to take part in. You participate however best you can, no skills are necessary. (Look in 'Scouting About' for the next date).

We have been working throughout the period to improve the area around the new toilet blocks, this has been a lengthy project, but it is nearly complete and has made such a difference to the access. We have also been making improvements to the Perk catering area.

Ahead of Remembrance Sunday a large Poppy appeared on the activity field. Only to be really seen from the air, it was drawn by a computer-controlled line making machine.





In early autumn preparations started for our Reindeer Workshop held as a fund raiser at the end of November. Publicity went out and ticket went on sale and were quickly sold out. The aim of this event is to build your own reindeer (with help) normally as a family group. It is a fun event with a **wow** factor and delivered by a fantastic and large team of around 50 people. There was also a chance to visit Santa too.











In December the next round of coppicing of our chestnut woodland started. This is contracted out through a woodland management company. We are regulated to harvest 10 acres per year and this brings a significant income to Buckmore Park without any physical effort on our part. The coppicing is part of managing woodland as a harvest crop and is on a rolling year on year programme of around 20years.



As part of our ongoing project to move all our buildings onto our tanked gas supply, on a very wet and muddy day in January we excavated a trench and laid a gas pipe from the side of the Perk area up to the Wynne Brook Lodge, Gillingham Districts building. The next stage was to get our supplier to connect it, sadly this took a while but is now complete.



This is the last of the buildings to be plumbed into the supply.

What of the future? The caving system is currently being extended. This year we will see the Ingle Nook building being refurbished. This will focus on the outside with cladding, new

windows and doors, new roller shutters, some remodelling to the rear with steps onto site B1. The interior too will be redecorated. And of course those 101 other jobs that need doing.
